GEORGE FISHER

Recent games have brought back memories of my father, George Fisher, who recently passed away on August 30th at the age of 90.

George played for Millwall, Fulham and Colchester during his football career. Benny Fenton the U's Manager signed George from Fulham and he quickly established himself in the first team. He was then made Captain and enjoyed a number of seasons with the U's before departing at the end of the 1959/60 season.

Layer Road was the home of Colchester in his days and, as his son, I was allowed into many areas of the stadium not seen by the general public. The home dressing room was so small compared to today's one. Eleven pegs only for kits as no substitutes were allowed. The smell of horse oils was always evident. There was only one trainer to try to repair damaged limbs or cuts. Oranges were cut into quarters to quench thirsts at half time; there were no energy drinks or fruit bars. At the end of the game there was no cool down session, players used the communal bath. If it was a cold wet muddy day it always paid to be one of the first to use it. Training sessions always involved a lot of running, usually in the streets around the ground. The players could not take it easy at the back of the pack because the trainer, Bill Light, would be following them on his bike and tell them in no uncertain terms to get a move on! No state of the art training grounds were available in those days and, if the team were to kick the football, the Colchester Garrison ground was used on many occasions to protect the Layer Road pitch.

How things have changed since his era. The professional footballer of his day was paid £10 a week and had to make their own way to home matches often travelling by train or bus. On away matches the team would often have to travel on the day no matter where they were playing. The thought of booking into a hotel the night before was out of the question because lower league clubs could not afford the bills. The kit would arrive with the team and players would then pick out their kit. There would only be one set per person. The outfield players would be numbered 2-11 with no names on the back and no change of kit at half time. If the shirt/shorts got muddy they stayed muddy! Any injury on the pitch was managed by the "trainer" running on with a sponge and bucket of cold water. At the end of the football season (during the summer months) the wages would reduce so my Dad had to get a summer job to earn money for us, his family. Can you imagine the likes of David Beckham having to work on a building site to feed his family! I recall Dad once coming home with a bandaged head after he got hit by bricks from the demolishing of a chimney breast. No Health and Safety hard hat for him!

Nowadays our team has a Luxury coach to take them to away matches. A Kit Man to look after their needs and lay out their kit with spares at half time should they wish to change for the second half. Players are so valuable that a fully qualified Medical Team is available for the management of any injuries. On return coach journeys highly nutritious food and drink are available to ensure energy levels are restored as soon as possible.

JUST THE TICKET

With the introduction of Print-At-Home tickets by the club from the beginning of this season, some collectors will find that their match day souvenirs are reduced. Many attending games now like to have a set of ticket, programme and teamsheet. The ticket confirms your attendance at the match if you look back at details of the game. This newsletter, I thought that I would look at some of those I have from Colchester games since the start of the year 2000.

If you look at tickets from different clubs, they all have one thing in common, the match details. However the difference is the background detail and colouring which makes them of interest. Most will have the club colours forming part of the text and also the badge is integrated somewhere, with sponsors often incorporated and the league or competition logo also included.

The first ticket I have selected is from an F. A. Cup match at Layer Road versus Leamington from season 2005/06. The club colours are prominent with the U's Eagle outlined in Gold. The sponsors

are also featured as are the match details so nothing remarkable about the ticket. However a remarkable score line of 9-1 makes the ticket a nice item to have.

Next up is a ticket from the same competition in the same season, but an away trip to Chelsea. The layout on this item has a blue border across the top with the club name in gold lettering, possibly reflecting the Premier League status of the team and the badge towards the edge. The rest of the ticket has a white background with the lion from the badge taking up a third of the area. Match details are shown and sponsors logos on the far right hand side. The game was played on a Sunday in front of a television audience and 6,000 plus travelling supporters. I will never forget the looks on the Chelsea supporters faces when the U's took the lead and Chelsea only looked like a Premiership team when they brought on Joe Cole and Frank Lampard for the second half.

Finally from the same season was our final match on the 6th May at Yeovil. A blue border top and bottom (I thought they had green as their dominant colour), club badge top left and the team name depicted in yellow. The bottom border shows the league and a local sponsors logos. The rest of the ticket has a background picture of the Main Stand for which I had one of only fifty seat tickets the club were allocated. Again the match was not one to remember for action on the field, but of course the end result of a goalless draw meant so much! Celebrations on and off the pitch were momentous and the journey home on the coach was a joy.

On now to the first game at the highest level the U's had ever played at, away to Birmingham. The ticket has a white border left hand side and across the top which shows the club badge and name. The remaining space has a background picture of a game in progress under floodlights, with the match details and price of £25 shown. Welcome to the Championship! The U's gave a good account of themselves with Richard Garcia scoring the first goal at this level and the U's showed that we had a team who could compete even with a smaller playing budget than most of the other teams in the division.

The last ticket is from one of my own personal favourite games, when being a football supporter seems to be absolutely one of life's great pleasures! The date Saturday August 8th 2009 and we are at Carrow Road - yes that game. A 7-1 win and one of the best performances by a Colchester United team that I think I have ever seen. The ticket as you would expect has a green tone to it, with the Norwich badge in the background. Gold lettering at the top for the club name and league sponsors on the left hand side and club sponsors on the right. Match details and prices are then printed in black.


None of the above tickets have any real monetary value, but as a souvenir of memorable matches they are priceless.



Dear CUSA,

I write the following for publication. The CUSA does very good work particularly arranging travel and I am proud to support them.

However, in my view there needs to be a complete reappraisal of their approach particularly in voicing concerns about the running of the Club.

'Tough Love' is a phrase that comes to mind. Over the last three seasons Col U have rocked. Three times relegation was avoided - just. Many of us thought it was not possible given mistakes made compared with other Clubs. Now we are facing a desperate season after only four games.

So what is wrong? Much is clearly so. But what is CUSA approach? A following of the decisions made by the Club. We must all be grateful to the CUSA but I see no reference to issues put forward by so fans in any published comment. But Col U are:-

- following a youth policy that will be the ruin of the Club.
- demoralising the young side put out each week to face seasoned older professionals.
- showing a complete lack of craft necessary to win games.
- so porous in defence that each side we face looks like Barcelona!
- unable to recruit and retain seasoned professionals look at the exodus in past seasons.
- lacking a managerial set up many fans believe is able to cope in League 1.

I have very great concerns about the future for the Football Club we support. CUSA has a great local presence. It has a column in each match programme. It also has a column in the Essex Standard.

I would urge CUSA to take a more critical stance towards the running of the Club. It need not be negative but the Col U Chairman appears to take the support of CUSA for granted and with it many of the fans. Unless action is taken then it will surely become very critical.

There needs to be fundamental changes both in the Club and CUSA. I personally would support a summit to be held at which the views of all the fans including CUSA could be put forward.

I do hope that this can be published in your newsletter. I was unable to attend the AGM owing to the notice of it not being received. I am also sending a copy to BBC Radio Essex and other news outlets as this a matter I believe of much local importance.
